General History/Biography

The European Union: A Very Short Introduction. John Pinder.
A clear and concise history of the union of many diverse nations.

The Improbable Voyage. Tristan Jones.
In 1985, the legendary, one-legged Royal Navy skipper Tristan Jones set off on a 2,307-mile voyage across Europe, traveling from the North Sea to the Black Sea via the Rhine and Danube rivers.

A Time of Gifts. Patrick Leigh Fermor
A British travel writer's poignant chronicle of his 1,200-mile walking trip from Holland to Hungary in 1934 at the age of 18 provides insight into a Europe hovering on the brink of World War II.

Hungary

A Concise History of Hungary. Miklós Molnár.
A concise, but comprehensive 1,000-year history of the country through its 1988 free elections.

The Hungarians: A Thousand Years of Victory in Defeat. Paul Lendvai.
Absorbing history of a proud and passionate people.

Austria

The Habsburgs: Embodying Empire. Andrew Wheatcroft.
Follow the dynasty that ruled much of Central and Eastern Europe for six centuries.

Mozart: His Character, His Work. Alfred Einstein.
Classic study of Mozart's character and works by one of the world's greatest music historians.

Schubert's Vienna. Raymond Erickson.
Chronicling the life of one of the 19th century's most prolific composers and the city where he lived.

The Third Man. Graham Greene.
A novella about intrigue in post-World War II Vienna, which later became the Oscar-winning 1949 film starring Orson Welles and Joseph Cotton. The giant Ferris wheel (the *Riesenrad*) the two men rode in the movie still graces Vienna's Prater Park.
